Why Land Acknowledgements are Important in Healthcare

ICON-VCH INDIGENOUS HEALTH ROUNDS

The interCultural Online health Network (iCON) and Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH) Aboriginal Health hosted a virtual Indigenous health round on September 22, 2020. The topic was "Why land acknowledgements are important in healthcare" and we were honoured to have Xalek'/Sekyu Siyam, Chief Ian Campbell from the Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish) Nation as the guest speaker. WHY LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS ARE IMPORTANT IN HEALTHCARE

- Acknowledges that Indigenous peoples have something valuable to share in welcoming all settlers to their lands and building a future together.
- Recognizes and acknowledges that the territory we live and work in belongs to a group of peoples who occupied it
 far before settlement.
- Demonstrates our understanding of the diversity and connectedness of the Indigenous peoples across North, Central and South America.

UNDERSTANDING THE IMPACT OF LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS IN HEALTHCARE

Celebrates that
Indigenous history is
all Canadians' history.

Moves beyond stigma and stereotypes towards compassion for the generations of trauma that Indigenous people have been subjected to.

When we change the narrative, we can correct the behaviour. Let us collaborate towards a shared, prosperous future for all. Let us work to sustain and revitalize Indigenous cultures and languages and pass them to the next generations.

Acknowledges the history of marginalization, alienation and legislative oppression of Indigenous peoples that has occurred under Canadian regimes. Acknowledges that Indigenous people did not give consent to settlement nor the development of Indigenous Residential Schools.

Contributes to the continuous work of Reconciliation and Reconcili-action:
Listen --> Understand --> Develop and Take Actions.













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PRACTICAL TIPS FOR LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT IN YOUR PRACTICE

If you are not sure, keep it simple. As a base rule, acknowledge the territory in which you reside/work.

Learn, practice, and use every word or phrase you can, when you can. You are helping keep the culture and language alive.

Show gratitude. Give thanks to the land of Indigenous peoples.

Include Indigenous language signs, artworks, and others that celebrate the land in healthcare settings.
